For Deactivated or Terminated Programs:

1. State the reasons for deactivating or terminating the program, and provide copies of any relevant documents.

We are unable to offer on a regular basis the required major courses for Option VI. Furthermore, we have not had any students major with Option VI in many years. For the past two decades, practically all our students in Italian have chosen to major with Option VII, instead of Option VI.

2. What will be done to minimize the impact of the deactivation or termination of the program upon the personal and professional lives of the faculty and staff involved? Include specific information on: a) how faculty and staff will be notified of the deactivation or termination, and b) how faculty and staff will be reallocated.

The termination of Option VI will not affect the faculty in the Italian program: they will continue to teach the same courses they have been teaching since the semester conversion in 2000-2001.

3. What will be done to insure that deactivation or termination of the program does not weaken other programs (graduate, undergraduate, or professional) for which the department may be responsible?

The termination of Option VI will not weaken the B.A. in Romance Languages because students of Italian will be able to major with Option VII.

No students are currently enrolled in Option VI. Our undergraduate advisor has already been notified about our request to terminate this Option; and she will notify any prospective majors about its imminent termination.

5. What plans, if any, are there for subsequent reactivation of the deactivated program?

Since Option VII is still available to students of Italian, and since Option VII is more flexible than Option VI, we see no need in the future to reactivate the latter Option.
